Dear Parents/Carers.

This is a polite reminder about the Emmaville school uniform and is a section that has been taken from the uniform policy, which is on the school website. We appreciate the support of parents at all times and would hope that children come to school in the correct uniform.

Please note if your child comes to school in trousers, they should be grey and not black. School cardigans should be in sweatshirt material and not knitted. Please make sure that your child wears black school shoes and not trainers.

Boys

Dark purple sweatshirt (not knitted), preferably with school logo

Light grey polo shirt, preferably with school logo

Grey school trousers or shorts

Grey socks

Black, smartly kept shoes

Girls

Dark purple sweatshirt or sweatshirt cardigan (not knitted) preferably with school logo

Light grey polo shirt, preferably with school logo

Grey straight or pleated school skirt, grey trousers or grey pinafore dress (no culottes or shorts)

In summer purple checked (not striped) dress

Grey or white socks or grey tights (not purple or black)

Black, smartly kept shoes

Long hair should be tied back for safety reasons. Ribbons, bobbles, hair bands and slides should be simple in style and only in the school colours of purple or grey.

We would recommend that the outer garment of a child's clothing has the school logo on. For example if a child comes to school wearing only a polo shirt then it would be preferable if it contained the logo. However it is not expected that the summer dresses have the logo on them.

Parentmail




